FOUND IN HIM

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3) Which one of the Old Testament narrative in which Jesus is present means the most to you? Why?

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4) How does seeing Jesus as the subject of the whole Bible change how you interpret the Bible?

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5) In four or five sentences, summarize this chapter.

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2 Come Adore and Bended Knee

FOUND IN HIM

- 1) The incarnation is utter mystery. How can God be both God and man at the same time without losing his God-ness or his man-ness? Even though it is a mystery (and we should be used to mysteries by now – think of the Trinity), we must not let our incomprehension keep us from finding the comfort that it is meant to bring. What to you is the most comforting part of the incarnation? Why?

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- 2) Martin Chemnitz wrote that Satan's goal is to steal the truth of the incarnation away from us. Why would Satan want us to give up in confusion when trying to think about this? How successful has our enemy been in his quest to desensitize or confuse us about the God-man?

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3) When Jesus was presented at the temple at about six weeks old, two saints, Simeon and Anna, worshiped him. Look up in Luke 2:29-38 the words they used to describe him and think about why they had the response they did.

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4) Mary was told that she was “blessed” above all women but that a sword would “pierce through your own soul” (Luke 2:34-35). In what way does knowing that Mary suffered for her faith, though she was blessed, encourage you today? If you've had children, you know what it is to hold and behold your little baby, to look into his eyes and want the best for him and hope that he will never have to suffer. How does Mary's faith help you today?

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5) Even if it is the middle of summer, why not stop right now and listen to some Christmas music? It might be a good time to fall on your knees.

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3) In what ways do you see yourself as Mary, worshiping the Savior against popular wisdom?

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4) In what ways do you see yourself and the masses in Jerusalem – worshiping and crying out for salvation one day, refusing him and crying out for his death the next?

FOUND IN HIM

Rather than give you a series of questions to consider, let me encourage you to take time in prayer and reflection to ask the Holy Spirit to comfort and assure your heart in whatever way he would.

- 1) Consider the words to this old hymn, as you think of his great love for you:

Jesus, Refuge of the weary,
Object of the spirit's love,
Fountain in life's desert dreary,
Savior from the world above.
O how oft Thine eyes, offended,
Gaze upon the sinner's fall;
Yet upon the cross extended,

Jesus may our hearts be burning
With more fervent love for Thee;
May our eyes be ever turning
To Thy cross of agony;
Till in glory, parted never
From the blessed Savior's side,
Graven in our hearts forever,
Dwell the cross, the Crucified.

FOUND IN HIM

- 1) “We also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we now have received reconciliation” (Rom. 5:11). How often do you rejoice because of the reconciliation? What would “rejoicing in God” look like in your life?

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- 2) We are united, one with him for “the bodies of Christians are one with the resurrected Christ.” Although this is a great mystery, ask the Holy Spirit to help you understand. How would your life be different if you really believed that you were one like this with the resurrected Christ?

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3) “The eternal Son became our brother; took upon Himself our sin ... paid our debt to the majesty of [unbreakable] law; covered our nakedness with His righteousness; presented us, as those in whose stead He appeared, unblamable and acceptable to the Father; excited the hallelujahs of angels at our exaltation; elevated us to a participation of His own riches, blessedness, and privileges; pitched tents of peace for us around the throne of God; and connected us with Himself by the bonds of eternal gratitude and affection. Such is the edifice which the Almighty reared upon the ruins of sin.” Respond.

- 1) How does thinking about yourself as chosen, betrothed, beloved, and named transform you? Which one of those four words speaks most deeply to you? Why?

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- 2) Being “kept” in his name guarantees both provision and protection. In the Old Testament the name of the Lord is pictured as a strong tower (Ps 61:3: Prov 18.10). Can you think of any other metaphors for his name?

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3) When Christians are said to be “justified in the name” (1Cor 6:11), the implication is that the unchangeable nature of Jesus is the ground of our secure possession of all the blessing he has earned. Respond.

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4) When speaking of his role as “friend of the bridegroom,” John the Baptist said, “The one who has the bride is the bridegroom” (John 3:29). What does the reality of Jesus having you for his bride mean? What does it mean to you particularly?
